

Sundiata Keita Cha-Jua teaches in the departments of African American Studies and History at the University of Illinois. He chaired African American Studies at the University of Illinois from 2001-2008 and at the University of Missouri from 1991-1994.

He authored *America's First Black Town, Brooklyn, Illinois, 1830-1915* (Urbana: University of Illinois Press, 2000) and co-edited *Race Struggles* (University of Illinois Press, 2009) with Theodore Koditschek and Helen Neville. He was the lead author of "The Long Movement' as Vampire: Temporal and Spatial Fallacies in Recent Black Freedom Studies" in the *Journal of African American History* which co-won the 2009 *OAH EBSCOhost America: History and Life Award* for the best journal article in United States History, 2007-2009.

Cha-Jua was President of the National Council for Black Studies, 2010-14, Senior Editor of *The Black Scholar*, 2011-15; and currently is an Associate Editor of the *Journal of African American History*.
