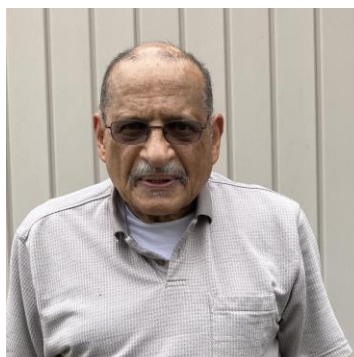

**Dr. Antonio F. Holland**, Kansas City, MO received BA and MA degrees in History from Northeastern University (Boston, MA.), and a PH.D in History and a minor area in Sociology from the University of Missouri-Columbia. He is an Emeritus Professor from Lincoln University; retired Lt. Col., Missouri Army National Guard, and Adjunct Professor at Blue River Community College. He is author of **Nathan B. Young and the Struggle over Black Higher Education**, and co-author of **The Soldier's Dream Continued**, and **Missouri's Black Heritage**. Dr. Holland is currently the historian for the local branch of ASALH.
