
Joyce Mosley, the author of "Gram's Gift," will tell the story of her African

American family with African, European, and Native American roots living in

Philadelphia as free people during slavery. She traces her family history to Cyrus Bustill, born enslaved, purchased his freedom, operated a successful bakery, and provided bread for George Washington's troops at Valley Forge the winter of 1777-1778.

Guy Oreido Weston, Managing Director of the Timbuctoo Historical Society, will discuss his maternal ancestry in Timbuctoo, New Jersey, where his fourth great grandfather bought land in 1829. He will discuss the development of Timbuctoo in its early years, drawing from deeds from land purchased by Black people, corporation certificates, census records, and newspaper articles, many of which go back decades before the Civil War.
