Edna Greene Medford, Ph.D., is Professor of History Emerita and former Associate Provost for Faculty Affairs at Howard University. Her research has focused on American slavery, the Civil War, Emancipation and Reconstruction. Over the last 35 years, she has shared her scholarship through publications as well as providing commentary for historical documentaries, participating in media interviews, and presenting invited talks here and abroad. She is the author of Lincoln and Emancipation (in its second printing), co-author of The Emancipation Proclamation: Three Views, and editor of the history report for New York's African Burial Ground Project. She has also authored numerous refereed articles and book chapters that have appeared in both national and international publications. She is currently coauthoring a book-length study of a midwestern Black family's remarkable journey in the generational pursuit of freedom and equality in America. Dr. Medford is the recipient of several honors and awards, among them the 2009 special bicentennial "Order of Lincoln," from the state of Illinois; the College of Liberal Arts Alumni Achievement Award from the University of Illinois at Urbana (2013), the Lincoln Diploma of Honor from Lincoln Memorial University (2014); and the Howard University Distinguished Faculty Award (2021).
