
Juneteenth commemorates the freedom of more than 250,000 enslaved Black people in the state of Texas. Juneteenth is now observed as a national holiday annually on June 19, celebrating the emancipation of those enslaved in the United States.

Juneteenth, also known as Freedom Day, commemorates the abolition of slavery in the United States. It is celebrated on June 19th, the day in 1865 when Major Gordon Granger and over 2000 Black Union soldiers arrived in Galveston, Texas and announced that all enslaved Blacks in Texas were free. It is considered the oldest known celebration of the end of slavery in the United States.





Galveston, Texas, the birthplace of Juneteenth



- The original Absolute Equality-Juneteenth mural, a stunning 5,000 square
- foot installation painted by Reginald C. Adams and commissioned by the
- Juneteenth Legacy Project, is a powerful visual narrative. It features five
- portals, each depicting significant moments in the journey to freedom and equality. From the arrival of enslaved Africans on ships, including Esteban's
- historic landing in 1528, to Harriet Tubman's heroic leadership in the Underground Railroad, the mural encapsulates the profound history of Juneteenth.

The centerpiece of the mural is General Order No. 3, issued by General Granger on June 19, 1865 in Galveston, TX, with the powerful phrase "absolute equality" ingeniously woven into the imagery. The mural stands as a testament to resilience, honoring the legacy of Juneteenth while fostering dialogue and understanding.

Following the mural's awe-inspiring unveiling in Galveston, Texas, and the national recognition of Juneteenth as a holiday in June 2021, Reginald C. Adams envisioned taking the story of Juneteenth beyond Galveston's shores. The Absolute Equality-Juneteenth mural project now spans multiple cities, spreading the message of freedom and unity to new communities across the nation.




















2021-2023 MURAL SITES

L. Dunbar K-8 Center located in the heart of Wynwood's


Host Cities

The host cities selected for the proposed 2024 Absolute Equality-Juneteenth murals carry profound historical significance in the context of African American heritage and the struggle for freedom. New York City, as a hub of diversity and activism, has played a crucial role in the civil rights movement. Boston, with its rich abolitionist history, was pivotal in the fight against slavery. Washington DC, the nation's capital, represents the seat of power where critical decisions have shaped African American rights.

Public art helps express a community's history and heritage and creates an elevated sense of awareness of the values of the community for residents and visitors.




Cultural Identity




Take A Stand


You have a unique opportunity to become part of history by taking a stand for "Absolute Equality".
