MCCARTHY OUSTED AS SPEAKER

In historic vote, Dems join GOP critics to fire him days after shutdown averted

WASHINGTON — As U.S. House members began voting one by one Tuesday on whether to oust Kevin McCarthy as speaker, a sense of déjà vu fell.

It was like the 15 rounds of voting required in January to choose the California Republican to lead the body. To win, McCarthy made some promises. And those promises brought him down.

Just days after Congress averted a

federal government shutdown, conservative rebels fired McCarthy, the leader whose negotiations kept the lights on. The historic vote was 216-210. It was the first time the House has ever passed a motion to vacate the speakership.

Rep. Patrick McHenry, R-N.C., was appointed speaker pro tempore. One of the key concessions McCarthy made to conservatives was agreeing to let a single lawmaker initiate a motion to vacate. On Tuesday, Rep. Matt Gaetz, R-Fla., pulled the trigger, and turmoil

Debate leaves GOP voters sour on Christie

Most in New Hampshire survey want him to exit

New Hampshire voters have a blunt message for Chris Christie. Get off the island.

In an exclusive USA TODAY/Boston Globe/Suffolk University poll in New Hampshire, 41% of likely Republican primary voters who watched last week's debate cited the former New Jersey governor as the winner, or rather loser, in a question of which of the seven participants should drop out of the presidential race first.

Former Vice President Mike Pence was a distant second at 17%. North Dakota Gov. Doug Burgum was named by 16% and tech entrepreneur Vivek Ramaswamy by 11%.

That's particularly bad news for Christie, who has centered his campaign in New Hampshire. The first-in-the-nation primary is open to independents as well as Republicans, and the state's libertarian instincts — the
