Mr. Glenn North is the Director of Inclusive Learning and Creative Impact at the Kansas City Museum. He received an MFA in Creative Writing from UMKC and is the author of *City of Song*, a collection of poems inspired by Kansas City's rich jazz tradition and the triumphs and tragedies of the African American experience. He is a Cave Canem fellow, a Callaloo creative writing fellow and a recipient of the Charlotte Street Generative Performing Artist Award. His ekphrastic and visual poems have appeared in art exhibitions at the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, the American Jazz Museum, and the Nerman Museum of Contemporary Art. Glenn is also an adjunct English professor at Rockhurst University and is currently filling his appointment as the Poet Laureate of the 18th & Vine Historic Jazz District.

In line with ASALH's 2024 theme "African Americans and the Arts," poet **Glenn North** will look at the history of African American poetry, how it has helped contextualize the Black experience, and how it has been an effective tool in the pursuit of liberation. North will also discuss the *Restorative Poetics Initiative* he is implementing as the Kansas City Museum's Poet-in-Residence.
